On September 13, 1864, a twenty-fouryear-old set foot on American soil, leaving Germany six weeks prior; turning age 24, just eleven days prior to stepping on American soil. He had all his earthly belongings in a wooden box he had made for the journey. He was dodging the draft presently taking place in his homeland and he was looking for his two brothers, Henry and William, in Illinois, who had already reached American soil and were sheep farmers. His name was August Gottlich Fesser, a baptized Lutheran and faithful child of God from Seershausen, Hanover County, Germany. In that first year, his sheep herd died, his brothers had nothing else to offer him, so he joined some friends, chicken farmers, who wanted to keep from paying taxes on a new courthouse, moved from Macoupin County to Montgomery County. It was a curious but great relationship, his friends who were Democrat and August who was a Republican; yet dear friends, the next generation, a couple marrying each other.

The story of my great-grandfather was not much different than the people I saw and met this week in El Paso, TX at the Rocky Mountain Synod Assembly. They were people coming from different countries, who made assorted decisions about moving for whatever reason. A difference in 2023 is not the immigrants/refugees who are Democrat or Republican, rather it is we, the American people making decisions about them who hold these claims to political parties. Another difference is the fact that my great-

grandfather was not considered "undocumented" but rather someone welcomed into the United States, to become a citizen, a hard-working, productive person who would grow, thrive, and make a good life. Another difference between 1864 and 2023 is the fact my great grandfather was white, from Europe, entering at New York versus those I saw and met trying to enter from Mexico, at the border all wearing brown skin.

There is no difference in the numbers, the many who came from Europe entering various points between New York and New Orleans match in comparison to the numbers coming from the south who have less space, less distance, and more regulations. One thing I saw and experienced this week, was that same faith Great Grandpa August carried with him, knowing whose he was in Christ Jesus, a

faithful, trusting brother who believed in and loved his Father, the Almighty. Greatgrandpa lived in communion with the Holy Spirit leading and guiding him each and every day, regardless of what or how the day unfolded, God holding him in the palm of his hand. The people at the border also live that way, having only their faith in Jesus Christ as their refuge, their strength, and their hope. And they carry their children trusting in Jesus, just as the faith-filled Europeans carried their wee ones to a new American home. This week spending the three days in El Paso, emerging with the border, walking alongside brothers and sisters struggling as undocumented, meeting the volunteers, faith communities and not-for profits who scramble for resources, support, and prayer, I pray as Jesus prayed to our Father to protect them all. As all reach to those who are different, those wanting to become hard-working citizens able to grow, thrive, and make a good life, I offer to all these brothers and sisters in faith, resources I have available; I share my voice with all of you how we all have been immigrant/refugee families sometime along the way; and I now recognize just how important it is to know and live the truth in Christ as they do.

In the book of Exodus God heard the prayers of His people in Egypt, and he brought them out from Pharoah away from

oppression and abuse. God was fully present in this immigration story. God was fully present in the immigration story of my great-grandfather leaving his homeland, bringing friends to be his family to help him out of oppression. God was fully present in the immigration story of Bertha, Rudy, and Angelika Hansch to bring them out of oppression to Bethlehem Lutheran where they were capable of becoming thriving, productive new citizens. God is present in the story at the border, bringing his people from the south out of oppression, abuse, and persecution. Audre Lorde's essay entitled, "Scratching the Surface" writes "forms of human blindness stem from the same root—an inability to recognize the notion of difference as a human force, one that is enriching rather than threatening..." This, our human blindness, is why Jesus prays for the disciples and for you and for me. This, our human blindness is why Jesus so wants all of us to know in truth, who he is, why he came, and that we might believe in Him, glorified in the Father, to not only share, but BE the good news in Jesus Christ!




